Extended Course Description

The purpose of the first part of the PhD macro sequence is to introduce students to modern macroeconomic theory with special emphasis on dynamic general equilibrium models of the macroeconomy. The course will teach students the key tools and central models of modern dynamic macroeconomics and use them to study growth, business cycles, asset pricing, and fiscal policy.

Evaluation

There will be a midterm and a final exam. The exact date of the midterm will be announced later, and it will be during the regular class time.
